Eighth Grade Summer Writing

Your summer writing project is designed to help with your transition into eighth grade. Similar prompts will continue through the year as you prepare to write <u>your</u> graduation essays in spring of 2023!

- 1. You must compose THREE pieces.
- 2. You will compose one piece for Dr. Freeberg. This will count as **ONE** piece.
- 3. Choose from the following topics. Compose at least two different kinds of pieces.
 - a) WHAT IS JUSTICE? Compose your own treatise!

 Speak with a relative, a friend, or a mentor; discuss the meaning of justice in the world today; compose a poem, personal essay, story, or song on the theme of justice.
 - b) A PORTRAIT OF JUSTICE Reflect on a person that you admire; conduct appropriate and relevant research; compose a one- to two-page biography. What makes this person an admirable and virtuous person, a "Portrait of Justice"? Yes, you may add a portrait.
 - c) JOURNALISM Think about the ongoing struggle for justice in the world. Pick a place, a time, an event—an actual struggle. The struggle can be from the past; the struggle can be from the present. Write a 300- to 1000-word story, article, essay, or report.
 - d) JUST WORDS Compose an extensive reflection on a meaningful quote that applies to the essential question of English 8. Why are these words helpful to us? How might these words help us to "keep going"?
 - e) JUST SONG Compose an extensive reflection on a meaningful song (or score) that connects with the essential question in English 8. Why are these words important or powerful? What do they teach us? What draws you to them?
 - f) BOOK REVIEW Write a 1- to 2-page book review on a work of fiction, nonfiction, or poetry that explores the <u>theme</u> of justice.
 - g) "FILM" REVIEW Write a 1- to 2-page movie review on a program, documentary or feature film that somehow relates to our essential guestion of justice.
 - h) FICTION Write an original work of short fiction.
 - i) NON-FICTION Explore ANY topic: the COVID-19 crisis, the climate crisis, our current political situation, the struggle for equal or human or animal rights, the natural world.
 - j) POEM . . . OR SONG! Hymn meter? Blank verse? Free verse? Linked seasonal haiku? It's up to YOU!
 - k) FREE CHOICE Yes, you may write about something else!
- 4. Each one of these THREE pieces should be a MINIMUM of one page. The maximum will be determined by <u>your</u> passion and enthusiasm.
